Children's Program (continued from p. 1)

This year the themes for the children's program include "The Jesus Story," "Jesus Lives," "Our Church," and "Sacraments." These themes are developed through storytelling, activities, prayer, and song. Preschoolers through grade six meet on the first three Sundays of the month, at 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. A children's liturgy, designed for the participation and understanding of children, is celebrated at 10:15 a.m. in the multipurpose room. Also available are preparation sessions for the sacraments of First Eucharist and Reconciliation. Sessions for parents assist them in preparing their children for the sacraments.

Junior High Program

The junior high program provides our youth with opportunities for learning, prayer, social activities, and service projects. This year the seventh and eighth grades will focus on Jesus and the Bible. The ninth grade will focus on Reverence for Life and Family. Classes meet on the first two Sundays of each month from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m., with speakers, filmstrips, and small-group discussions. The remaining Sundays provide social, service, and liturgical experiences. Retreats are also offered on special occasions during the year.

Senior High Program

The goals of the senior high program include communicating basic information about our Catholic faith tradition, familiarizing our youth with the Bible and its role in our daily lives, assisting our youth to mature in moral decision making, providing opportunities for faith reflection, and encouraging an attitude of loving service among our youth. To meet these goals, the senior high program provides educational, social, service, and liturgical experiences for our youth on Sundays from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. The focus of the tenth- and eleventh-grade program is scripture; that of the twelfth-grade program is commitment in the areas of vocations and careers, marriage and family life, and social concerns.

Adult Program

The adult religious education program fosters spiritual growth, maturity of faith, and community. Adults meet on the first three Sundays of each month at 9:00 and 10:15 a.m. to study and share responses to scriptural themes in the gospel of Luke and Acts. Participants will also study contemporary issues in the U.S. Catholic Bishops' pastoral letters on war and peace, on the economy, and on women.

Special Bible themes mark Advent and Lenten sessions: the prophetic literature and infancy narratives in Advent, and the psalms and passion narratives in Lent. At 11:30 a.m. on Sundays scripture training and support sessions will be offered for neighborhood Bible-sharing leaders. On Sundays (6:30-8:00 p.m.) and on the first and third Thursdays of each month (9:00-10:30 a.m.), other adult sessions will be held on Scripture and Ministry in Today's Church.

Other opportunities for Bible sharing and study are provided by St. Patrick's Champaign-Urbana Ecumenical Bible Group, facilitated by Lu Pillar and Barbara Murphy. For 12 weeks, from September 3 through November 19, one group will meet on Tuesdays at 9:00 a.m. to focus on "Moses, a Man Changed by God." From September 19 through November 7 (10 weeks), another will meet on Thursdays at 7:00 p.m. to consider "Incidents in the Life of Christ." After Christmas, this group will offer a study of Romans.

An opportunity to deepen understanding of our Catholic faith is provided by "Basic Themes of Roman Catholicism," a series presented on Wednesdays, 7:30-9:30 p.m. The series begins on September 25, breaks for December, and resumes in January.

Throughout the year short sessions will be offered on spiritual growth and wholeness, Church history, contemporary issues viewed in the light of faith, and moral decision making in today's world. Retreat experiences, days of reflection, and topical book discussions will also be offered from time to time. (continued on p. 3)

The family life program seeks to
nourish and support people in their family
life situations and to provide opportunities for sharing, listening, and being
heard.

A Young Adults group meets on Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m.; a Singles' Support Group meets on Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m.; baptism preparation classes are offered on the third Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m.; a Parents' Dialogue Group meets on second and fourth Thursdays of the month at 9:00 a.m.; Divorced, Separated, and Widowed Group meets on second and fourth Mondays of the month at 7:00 p.m.; and the Over-50s Group meets for a potluck once a month.

Express Your Joys In Singing

Did you know that musical prayer has such deep roots in our Christian traditions that making music is mentioned more than 2500 times in the scriptures? That's more than once per page in most modern translations. Many are the ways of "making a joyful noise unto the Lord," and St. Patrick's provides plenty of opportunities to do just that.

The <u>folk choir</u>, which provides musical leadership at the 9:00 a.m. Sunday Mass, invites anyone who enjoys singing or playing a musical instrument to join them for rehearsals on alternate Thursdays at 6:30 p.m.

The <u>traditional choir</u>, which leads the singing at the 10:30 a.m. Sunday Mass, welcomes anyone who enjoys singing and who appreciates the satisfaction of working toward excellence in a variety of choral music. No audition is required. This choir rehearses on Wednesdays at 7:00 p.m.

The <u>brass choir</u> lends depth and richness to the prayer of music at 10:30 a.m. Sunday Masses. Membership is open to anyone who plays a brass instrument and is willing to give a few hours a month.

<u>Cantors</u>, leaders of song, help us share more comfortably our humble gift of singing as we raise our minds and hearts and voices to the Lord. Cantors, usually in short supply, are needed at every weekend liturgy.

Nursery service is provided in the Parish Center on Sunday mornings from 8:45 a.m. until noon, and for other occasions on request. A marriage preparation couple sponsor program is also offered. Other opportunities for growth in family life will become available during the course of the year.

Concurrent with our programs in Urbana, the programs for children and adults in the St. Joseph-Ogden area of our parish meet on Wednesdays from 6:45 to 8:00 p.m. at the grade school in St. Joseph.

Highlights Of The Financial Report For FY 1984-85

There was good news in the parish's financial report, released last week. The last fiscal year (our fiscal year extends from July 1 through June 30) ended with a surplus of \$10,276 in the General Fund. With a total income of \$330,944 and total expenses of \$320,668, St. Patrick's Parish has moved decisively into the category of

a \$300,000-a-year operation.

In addition to paying for normal operating and program expenses, the contributions, special gifts, and memorials enabled the parish to purchase furniture appropriately sized for primary-grade youngsters in our religious education program, install a copier to eliminate daily trips to local copy shops by a busy staff, buy a personal computer to streamline clerical operations and facilitate recordkeeping for this growing parish, reroof the portions of the original Parish Center used for classrooms and meeting rooms, and, with the help of \$93,000 in loans from parishioners, retire the commercial portion of our debt to the diocese for the new wing of the Parish Center.

The financial report is prepared annually by Bill Subick, St. Patrick's Parish Finan-cial Officer. "One element of concern in this year's financial report," Bill said, "was the failure of weekly collections to meet budget projections." Parishioners contributed \$287,764, an amount 6 percent less than projected. The previous year's weekly offerings exceeded budget projections by "The burden of debt retirement, together with parishioners' requests for new and expanded programs," he cautioned, "make this leveling off of weekly contributions something to watch closely in the present

fiscal year."



We parishioners gather in groups and organizations to serve and to be served. We both seek and offer support and understanding. Collectively we strive "to grow more and more into a people who...tell of God's love by our deeds and our words" as we gather our resources to heal, to nourish, to protect, to share hope and joy.

The Young Adults of St. Patrick's Parish (loosely defined as between 18 and 35 years of age) meet each Tuesday evening for social, spiritual, and personal growth activities. Participants share in leadership and planning activities for this group.

The <u>Divorced</u>, <u>Separated</u>, and <u>Widowed Support Group meets</u> on second and fourth Mondays or each month. Its goal is to provide support for the divorced, separated, and widowed within a Roman Catholic framework, although participation is open to people of any religious affiliation. This self-help program assists participants in working through and accepting their own feelings as well as those of others in these life situations.

Members of the <u>Singles' Support Group</u> meet each Tuesday evening. Their goal is to help one another to grow spiritually. They have viewed videocassettes of Fr. Richard McBrien's <u>Understanding Catholicism</u> and are currently sharing their responses to ideas presented by R. Scott Peck in <u>The Road Less Traveled</u>.

The St. Vincent de Paul Society is a service-oriented group whose members respond to Jesus's call to feed the hungry, comfort the sick and shut-ins, and give shelter to the poor. Members are on call to provide help as needed to less fortunate members of our community as well as to those passing through who are in need of a meal, a night's lodging, a tank of gas, a bus ticket to the next town. Members meet weekly, on Wednesday evenings.

The Urbana Council 5752 of the Knights of Columbus offers fellowship and fraternity to its members, who are firmly committed to the support of St. Patrick's Parish and other charitable endeavors. The local Council raises money for the Special Olympics, provides special furnishings and equipment for the parish, and pays for costly repairs to parish buildings. Their Tuesday night Bingo generates most of the revenue that supports their projects.

Membership in the <u>Over 50s Club</u> is open to anyone over the age of fifty regardless of marital status. The group gathers monthly, usually on the last Sunday, to socialize with a potluck, dancing, games, sing-alongs, and good conversation. Occasionally members arrange for a bus and a day's outing.

The Parents' Dialogue Group provides a forum for parents to share ideas for more successful parenting, for imparting Christian values to children, and for mutual support. This group meets on second and fourth Thursday mornings, discussing such topics as the spirituality of parenthood and how to pray with children. Occasionally they take their children on field trips or invite a guest speaker to address them. Recently this group celebrated its first year by holding a picnic on parish grounds.

St. Patrich's Guild is a federation of women who serve the parish in a great many ways. They care for the parish altars, arrange for parish days of recollection, provide meals after funeral liturgies for the family and friends of the deceased, and cater wedding and anniversary receptions.

Through the Meals-on-Wheels program and the Medical Mission group, they serve the faith community both here and afar. Their popular annual fund raiser, the Cellar-to-Garret Sale, is a major source of revenue they share with the parish through the purchase of needed furnishings for parish buildings and flowers for seasonal church celebrations. They have also generously supported the work of the Worship and Prayer Committee with needed funds.

Members continue their ministry to residents of Champaign County Nursing Home, on Tuesdays bringing news, good cheer, and cookies and praying the rosary with them, and on Fridays celebrating Mass with them.

Without the organizational support in recent months normally provided by regular meetings, Guild members continue to tell of God's love by their deeds and their words.

LMLP Begins Its Second Year-

Twenty members of St. Patrick's Parish were among the 180 men and women who completed the first phase of the Lay Ministry Leadership Program, sponsored by the Diocese of Peoria. The program was offered in answer to the need for training to develop a sense of ministry and leadership skills for persons interested in lay minis-

try at the parish level.

Beginning last fall with a weekend retreat, which focused on lay spirituality, participants were invited to explore their own spirituality and their call to service in the Church. The retreat was followed by eight monthly sessions of a "core curriculum" designed to help participants further define and refine their roles as

lay ministers.

The October session, facilitated by Sr. Sheila Welch and Fr. Doug Hennessy, surveyed historical and contemporary views of Church in conveying a sense of the mystery of Church. Participants also reviewed the type indicators suggested by responses on the Myers-Briggs personality profile and their helpfulness in understanding differences in how we like to look at things and go about making decisions.

The November session was on scripture. Facilitators Fr. Ron Palmer and Sr. Rachel Bergschneider presented an overview of biblical scholarship, discussing oral and written tradition, fundamentalist interpretation of scripture, and the historical Jesus, connecting life experiences with

scriptural themes.

In January, facilitators Fr. Michael Schaab and Sr. Mary Ann Seiler presented a survey/discussion of Church doctrine and dogma and a discussion of models for adult learning.

Fr. Patrick Collins and Sr. Audrey Cleary presented the February session on liturgy and the sacraments, present encounters with the Risen Christ.

Moral decision making was the topic of the March session. Fr. Tom Murphy led the group in exploration of conscience and Christian moral principles.

The April session was facilitated by Fr. Ron Lievens, Sr. Norma Riplinger, and Dr. Ronald Boland, who explored the concepts of justice and peace for Christ's Church in the world and called participants to an experience of social injustice through role playing.

The year-long program came to a close in May with a day of evaluation and reflection. Participants from the entire diocese gathered in Peoria to assimilate and discuss -- in some cases, dispute -- the year's material, and to affirm one another

in one's ministry.

Each participant has the option of continuing in a second year of the program, which is designed to develop skills and understandings directly related to specific areas of ministry: family life, liturgy, social action, youth, and Bible study. Many participants from St. Patrick's have indicated their intention to continue.

Catholics who want to update their knowledge of their faith, and non-Catholics who want to learn more about Catholicism are invited to "Basic Themes of Roman Catholicism." This series will be presented on Wednesdays, 7:30-9:30 p.m., in the Parish Center under the direction of Fr. Doug Hennessy. Presentations will be repeated on following Saturdays, 9:30-11:30 a.m.

Beginning September 25, the eight-week fall session informally addresses the Catholic faith. After a December break, the series resumes in January, increasing in detail. The final segment begins with Lent and is directed to non-Catholics who wish to join the Church. The program concludes with the formal Rite of Christian Initiation, a ritual that increases the solemn beauty of the Easter Vigil at St. Patrick's.

Generous Hearts Generate Help

Our parish community has reason to be grateful to generous-hearted parishioners who have loaned to St. Patrick's \$93,000 at a lower rate of interest than the prevailing market rate. Their loans at $6\frac{1}{2}$ percent enabled the parish to repay the part of our debt to the Diocese of Peoria that was to have been refinanced at $12\frac{1}{2}$ percent. The 6 percent difference in interest rates applied to \$93,000 amounts to an annual saving of \$5580 for the parish.

This action from parishioner-lenders, by making it possible for St. Patrick's to repay a substantial sum to the Diocesan Loan Fund, has also helped the diocese in its efforts to help other growing parishes with loans at a lower-than-market rate of interest.

Of the original \$493,434 loan for construction of the new wing of our Parish Center, St. Patrick's has repaid \$124,434 in the last two years. Our indebtedness now stands at \$369,000, of which \$93,000 is owed to parishioners and \$276,000 to the diocese.
