Just then a smiling face appeared at the door--a delightful woman who, with her family, is temporarily in the U.S. from Budapest, Hungary, and wished to register in the parish.

Another parishioner arrived to check dates in preparation for a memorial prayer service, to which family and friends of deceased parishioners would be invited.

Our recently arrived Pastoral Associate was also scurrying about organizing her day, which would include visits at local hospitals and nursing homes.

Children Prepare for Christ's Coming

The children of St. Patrick's had a busy Advent in preparation for Christmas, according to Jan Lipska, coordinator of the Children's Program.

The kindergarten/first grade group at 9:00 made an altar cloth for use during Children's Liturgy and presented it to Fr. Kinder on Sunday, Dec. 11. The cloth was placed on the altar in the multipurpose room, where it was enjoyed throughout Advent by parishioners who gather on weekdays for mass.

The third- and fourth-graders of the 11:00 class collected cans of food to make up a basket to be taken to the Catholic Worker House for Christmas. They also held an open house for their parents on Sunday, Dec. 18.

The second-grade class at 9:00 made Jesse Tree ornaments, which they placed on a tree during class on Sunday, Dec. 11. Afterward the tree was moved to the multipurpose room for Children's Liturgy.

The second-grade class at 11:00 asked all of the participants in the Sunday morning classes to donate new or good, used mittens and hats to be given to the needy during the Christmas season.

Children who were to receive the sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time, and their parents, met several times during November. The children received this sacrament in two celebrations, on Nov. 29 and Dec. 6.

Parish Council News

At its meeting on Dec. 15 the Parish Council took action on a number of proposals.

Council members agreed to continue parish support for a full-time counsellor position at the regional Catholic Social Service office. This allocation will be formalized by establishing a separate line item in the budget for it.

Jim Mayer and Carolyn McElrath, on behalf of the ad hoc Spirituality Team, proposed that the parish adopt Renew as a parish-renewal program to take the place of the long-inactive program Christ Renews His Parish. Council members accepted the proposal unanimously for implementation next fall. Also accepted was the team's proposal to establish a stipended position. Renew Coordinator, who would report directly to the pastor.

The Social Action Committee, represented by Gary Laumann (chair) and several committee members, presented their program descriptions together with a strong recommendation for establishing a new staff position, Director of Social Justice Ministry. After lengthy discussion, action on the entire presentation was deferred to the January Council meeting.

The proposal for a new "Hospitality and Welcoming Program" met with Council's approval. This program, which will function as a part of the Family Life Ministry, seeks to welcome visitors and new members of the parish, to inform people about programs and services of the parish, and to offer an opportunity for participation in parish activities and programs.

In other action, the Council appointed an ad hoc committee to revise the Parish Council bylaws. They also endorsed Fr. Remm's proposal to look into the possibility of acquiring a property on Clark St. that may be available for purchase.

Members were reminded that full budget proposals for new and continuing programs are due at the next meeting from all standing committees.

The Parish Council meets next on Jan. 19; all parishioners are invited and welcome to attend these open meetings.


senior citizens this year through a donation to the Eastern Illinois Food Bank.

What else are these but a response to our call to worship, study, and serve God and to tell of God's love by word and deed? Year's end prompts reflection; year's beginning, resolution. Our response is personal but it can never be solitary, for we are indeed a people united by faith, by hope, and by love.



On Jan. 1 we celebrate--yes, the beginning of a new year, but also the feast of Mary, Mother of God, "Theotokos."

On Jan.4, we honor Elizabeth Ann Seton, first native-born American to be canonized, who founded the first American religious community, the first Catholic parish school, and the first Catholic orphanage in the U.S.

While John Neumann was bishop of Philadelphia, Catholic schools in America grew from 2 to 100. We remember him on Jan. 5.

Jan. 6 is the traditional date of Epiphany, the feast of the magi, the twelfth day of Christmas. We celebrate it on Sunday, Jan. 8, this year.

On Jan. 9, we conclude Christmastime with the feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

Jan. 16 is celebrated as the birthday of slain civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. "Lord . . . we give you thanks this day for your preacher and witness, Martin Luther King, Jr. . . . where our human community is divided by racism, may we give ourselves to your work of healing."

St. Anthony, one of the first "desert fathers" and founder of Western monasticism, lived in the wilderness after giving everything he owned to the poor. We remember him on Jan 17.

Jan. 18~25 is the week of prayer for Christian unity. Can we find a way to join in prayer with the brothers and sisters of our extended Christian family?

Agnes, virgin and martyr, is remembered on Jan. 21.

On Jan. 25 we celebrate the con→ version of Paul.

Jan. 28 is the feast of Thomas Aquinas, doctor of the Church and author of many theological and philosophical works, which include the Summa Theologica.

John Bosco, great friend of children and founder of groups that ministered to their needs. is remembered on Jan. 31.

St. Patrick's Guild Meets

On Nov. 16 members of St. Patrick's Guild gathered for a luncheon meeting at the Sea Merchant Restaurant. The following slate of officers was presented and approved: Lucille Kocher, president; Nancy Steerman, vice-president; Mary Sleeter, secretary-treasurer.

The Guild's annual parish fundraiser, the Cellar-to-Garret Sale, netted \$5207.14, half of which was to be presented to Fr. Remm for the parish at the next Parish Council meeting.

In other action, members agreed to donate \$2500 to the parish for reduction of the standing debt for the new wing of the parish center. A donation of \$600 will be made to the Eastern Illinois Food Bank to feed 10 senior citizens for one year.

Meals-on-Wheels, represented by parishioner Florence Chevalier, is in need of volunteer drivers for Feb. 20-24.

St. Patrick's Guild serves both our parish and the larger community in a variety of often hidden ways. Besides their involvement in Mealson-Wheels, which carries meals to shut-ins, and their sponsorship of the most successful of our parish fund-raisers, the Cellar-to-Garret Sale, members also roll bandages (Medical Missions), clean the church weekly (our parish sacristan is a member of the Guild), and after funerals provide meals for the family and friends of the deceased.

Their quiet and compassionate ministry to residents of Champaign County Nursing Home includes distributing cookies from the parish with a pleasant word to all, praying the rosary with those who choose this traditional Marian devotion, and bringing together all who desire and are able to celebrate mass.

New members, though always welcome, seem few and rare. If you enjoy sharing the companionship of others with similar interests or would like to participate in one or another of the activities named here, you might give one of the officers a call or leave your own name and number with the parish secretary for call-back.

The next meeting of St. Patrick's Guild will take place in the spring, after Easter. Watch the weekly bulletin for an announcement of time and place.
