A "Prayer Tree" Returns

A tree will soon spread branches in the sanctuary, leafing out

with the names of children who are preparing for their First Communion on Apr. 14.

Each
parishioner is
invited to take
the name of at
least one child
from the tree as a
reminder to pray
for that child and his or
her family during this time of

preparation. (Names will be replaced before each Mass, with

new name cards put on the tree branches, so there will be enough for all.)

"All parishioners are asked to do is to take a name, pray for the child every day, and write a note to the child for presentation on the day of First Communion," said Jan Lipska, children's program coordinator.

"Last year the children's eyes really lit up when they received

their notes on entering the church. It was very important for them and for their families to know that the parish as a whole supported them," Jan continued. "This is an opportunity for parishioners to show these children how members of a community can support one another."

A box will be placed in the church vestibule, and another in the parish center, a week before First Communion for parishioners' notes and cards.



A St. Patrick's Day Ice-Skating Party

The fourth annual Urbana Knights of Columbus St. Patrick's Day Ice Skating Party will be held from 5 to 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Mar. 20—not on St. Patrick's Day, but pretty close! (As usual, the University of Illinois Ice Arena is unavailable on St. Patrick's Day.)

The skating party has become a tradition at St. Patrick's with participation growing each year. Last year about 125 parishioners attended the event, and this year's organizers are hoping to pack the place.

Best of all, the event is free of charge to all parishioners. The Knights of Columbus offer the party as a gift to St. Patrick's, in gratitude for the parish's support of fish fries, pancake breakfasts, Tootsie Roll drives, and other KC

fund-raisers.

"We want to give something to the parish that is free—well, almost free," said Grand Knight Al Mytty. "There is a 50-cent skate rental charge."

"We really would like to see more members of the parish—families, singles, couples, students, the elderly—come out to try the wonderful skating conditions at the Ice Arena," he said. "It's bright and warm with smooth ice. A perfect place to work on your form!"

Even if you don't dare venture out on the ice, plan to stop by and say hello to your friends or to watch the others gliding around the rink. There will be hot chocolate and other refreshments at the Ice Arena.

This year's party is being held at



an earlier hour to avoid conflicts with evening meetings at St. Patrick's and to ensure that small children can get in some skating before going home to bed.

RENEW Small Groups, Big Rewards

Ever since Jesus ascended to heaven, Christians have relied on fellowship with others for encouragement in their faith. In the large parishes common today, it is easy to be anonymous and even lonely, even in the midst of other believers. In such an environment a person has few opportunities for faith sharing, and faith can become lukewarm.

To counter this problem, many parishes are establishing small groups for faith sharing in a variety of ways. These small groups enable participants to discuss their faith on a personal level and help them to focus better on their own prayer and life of faith.

The RENEW program at St. Patrick's, coordinated by Helene Kacich, has offered parishioners the opportunity to participate in small faith-sharing groups. These small groups have meant a great deal to participants, as indicated by the following comments shared by a few of the facilitators.

Jim Mayer says that one of the main benefits of the small faith-sharing group is that it helps an individual get to know others in the parish on a deeper level. He believes that we reaffirm our own faith when we express it in words to others.

Cliff Maduzia says that sharing our faith with others in a small group helps turn our ideas into more concrete faith. It gives faith both direction and focus. Cliff adds that smallgroup participants have found faithsharing very fulfilling and a boost in their prayer life.

Lenore Nagele finds that sharing her faith with others in a group helps her to review her own faith. Listening to others discuss their faith in depth also provides a different perspective, helping a person to see more clearly his or her own Godgiven gifts and

how to use them. And one person helps another in this growth process. Fellowship with others can help bring out their talents in ways that benefit others.

During the small-group sessions participants pray, read scripture, discuss their faith, and share their experiences, all related to a given topic. The sessions conclude with some discussion on how members may apply what they have learned, a final prayer, and some socializing.

Occasionally, some of the groups have arranged social functions to help them to get to know one another better. Small-group faithsharing has been a good way to

meet others in the parish and to get to know them. It has been especially helpful to new parishioners as a way of getting to know others and to learn about parish life at St. Patricks.

The facilitators know that it is often difficult for an individual to find a group that meets at just the right time or that has just the mix of personalities that person would feel comfortable with. They strongly recommend that if everything does not work out as hoped with the first small-group experience, a participant will keep trying. The benefit of fellowship with other Catholics is well worth the effort!







People Helping People

Through the Feed the Hungry collections and the "poor box," St. Patrick's parishioners are reaching many needy people in this area and in Jamaica, where the local St. Vincent de Paul Society helps the poorest of the poor through a "twinning" arrangement.

In January 106 families came to St. Patrick's for food, provided by the good offices of the local SVDP Society, which operates out of St. Patrick's. Others came requesting clothing, busfare, gas, shelter for the night.

The letter that follows is reprinted as received from a family the Society has helped:

To Byron and Friends,

Thinking of you through the holiday season. Last year at this time you were helping us with gas so we could go to St. Francis Hospital to be with our daughter Danielle. Finally we have had a great summer and she's walking and talking. Now it's winter again and she's having problems again but not as serious as last winter. Her asthma is real bad but with medication and breathing treatments she's stayed home so far. She did a couple of months ago have tubes put in her ears. January we are going to fix her left hand also (surgery). But to us that's not life threatening. So we will get through these problems.

Well, time for me to go but I thought I should stop to tell you again thank you for your support and we hope your holidays are special just like ours.

Lent Is the Springtime of the Church


The word "Lent" means springtime. This word comes from the same root as "lengthen," since daytime lengthens during Lent. The northern hemisphere turns toward the sun, the source of life, and winter turns into spring. In Hebrew the word for repentance is "teshuvah," rooted in "shuvah," "to turn," like the turning of the earth to the sun, like the turning of soil before planting. •

The word "sin" means separation. We are called to turn from our separate selves, from our sin, to come together in community. Selfdenial is the way we express our repentance. In the lengthening brightness from Ash Wednesday until Holy Thursday afternoon, our holy Lent, we turn away from sin and death. We turn to God as our source of life.

We turn together, as a parish, as a church of many colors, ages, and ways of life. We put aside our business-as-usual to support one another in prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. We turn to God to enlighten us and purify us throughout the lengthening brightness of our holy Lent. 🔑

Quick Fixin's from the Kitchen of... Joan Ellsworth

Irish Bread
2 c bread flour
5 t baking powder

1/2 t salt

1 T sugar

3 T butter

1/2 cup seedless raisins

1/2 cup currants

1 T caraway seed

1 c milk



Mix flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar. Cut in butter (not margarine). Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Bake in iron frying pan moistened with a small amount of oil. Bake one hour at 350 degrees.
