

Baptistry Art Nears Completion

Nick Britsky has been working on art for the new church baptistry for over a year and says that it is now about ready to be placed in St. Patrick's church.

This major project has three parts. It includes a panel for the tabernacle area that unites symbols of Baptism (water) and Confirmation (fire) with Eucharist. It also includes the new Marian shrine, which will replace the former confessional (now serving as a closet) on the east side of the church. And it includes a new baptistry, located where the statue of Mary now resides.

The confessional structure will be removed and the alcove redecorated with back-lighted acrylic panels resembling stained-glass windows. The statue of Mary now in the front of the church will be repaired and repainted before being placed in this alcove, more accessible than in its present location.

The baptistry itself, in the alcove to the east of the main altar, will be graced by a relief depicting the baptism of Jesus by John, with the present baptismal font before it.

The Building and Grounds Committee plans to start the remodeling work around mid-September, removing the former confessional and preparing the alcove to receive Nick's acrylic panels and the refurbished statue of Mary. Their goal is to have all



remodeling finished by the feast of the Immaculate Conception, Dec. 8, but by the end of January at the latest.

Fr. Remm says that the remodeling is expected to cause little disruption, since the work will be done during the week and workers will take special measures to keep the church clean of debris.

St. Patrick's parishioners can be thankful for those who have given donations to defray expenses for this threefold project, for Nick Britsky's sharing of God-given talent and his time and labors at an age when many of us might look forward to a lessening of responsibilities and commitments, for the labor freely given by members of the Building and Grounds Committee, and for all others who help to bring the project to a successful conclusion.

RENEW Builds on a Sound Foundation: Prayer

On Sept. 3 the RENEW Prayer Network gets underway to lay the sound foundation of prayer for our parish's last (fifth) season of RENEW. All parishioners are invited to join this network of prayer, individually or as a part of the group that will gather weekly during the six weeks of "pre-RENEW."

Those who can come together to pray for the spiritual renewal of St. Patrick's parish will meet in the parish center lounge from 11:00 a.m. to noon on Tuesdays. Some may wish to follow with Mass at 12:10 and lunch with friends afterward.

The prayer sessions include communal prayer, scripture readings with reflection, petitions, and song. No Bible study, this, but a time to come together to pray. Prayer network sessions will be discontinued once RENEW starts up (Oct. 13) to avoid scheduling conflicts with small-group faithsharing meetings, but all are encouraged to keep up their prayers during the RENEW process.

If you are not free to join the prayer network group on Tuesday mornings, try to pray individually or with your family for the spiritual renewal of our parish. Prayer is at the heart of RENEW; it lays the foundation for the renewal process itself, for the small group faith sharing and for the special events and activities planned for this last season of RENEW.

Co-chairs of the RENEW Prayer Network, Tom and Lori McDonough, invite you to call if you have questions and to join them for the 11:00 a.m. prayer sessions on the Tuesdays preceding the startup of RENEW.

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Some Important RENEW Dates

Sept. 21-22: Sign-up Weekend for the RENEW small groups. Groups of 6-14 people will meet weekly for about 1 1/2 hours to reflect on and discuss the week's theme, introduced in the Sunday liturgy. The overall theme of this last season of RENEW is Evangelization. (If you don't know what this term means, join a group and find out what it can mean to you, to your family, and to your parish!) About 25 groups met during each of the preceding seasons of RENEW, and there's always room for more! Will you help to swell the number this fall?

Oct. 4 (Friday): A special RENEW Mass will be celebrated with all existing small-group members, members of RENEW committees, and everyone interested in "renewing" themselves that evening. A social will follow. More details to come, so mark your calendars now.

Oct. 13: This date marks the beginning of the first of the six weeks of RENEW for this fall.

Any suggestions? Questions? Call Helene Kacich, parish RENEW coordinator; she says that planners are still planning, so all suggestions are welcome.

3/4 c instant tea
2 c Tang
1 pkg Wyler's Lemonade Mix
1 3/4 c sugar
1 t ground cloves
1 t ground cinnamon

At funerals, the Funeral Schola facilitates the congregations's song.

The choirs will resume their ministry with the hiring of a new Music Director. There is room for singers and instrumentalists at all levels of skill. But there's no need to wait! Call the parish office to express your interest, and you'll be contacted as soon as the choir season begins.

Parish Council News

At their August meeting Parish Council members unanimously approved a motion appointing Paul Hughes to fill out the term of member Dave Murrell, who is leaving the parish for an out-ofstate post.

Dave, whose championing of tithing as a parish practice, new ideas in tackling problems, and sense of humor were acknowledged by the Council, was warmly thanked for his participation in Council activities and responsibilities.

Cathy Salika, chair of the search committee for the position of Music Director, reported that the most recent nominee has chosen a position elsewhere. A new search has begun.

Tom Kacich, reporting for the Development Committee, said that 204 needs assessment surveys were sent out and about half of them have been returned so far. Of the parish census forms sent out to registered parishioners, 572 have been returned. Chuck Shaw and Carol Bosley have joined the Development Committee, which is currently discussing endowment funds.

Fr. Remm commented that 475 pledges, totaling \$62,188, were received in response to the diocesan Annual Stewardship Appeal. Of this amount \$37,702 has already been paid.

The planning committee for the parish's Sacrificial Giving (Time, Talent, Treasure) program expects to emphasize the giving of time and talent. On Sept. 28-29 a parishioner will speak at all Masses, with emphasis on awareness of the ways that people give



of their time and talents. Tables will be set up in the main hall with information about areas for volunteer involvement and for receiving pledges.

Helene Kacich presented a potpourri of post-RENEW opportunities for educational and spiritual growth developed by the ad hoc committee after consultation in a variety of ways with members of the parish.

Jan Lipska has been hired to serve as Senior High Coordinator while David Zola is on leave of absence. Jan will continue to serve as coordinator of the children's program at St. Patrick's.

Jeff Nelson is casting about for some way to get the Social Committee going again. He'd like to find a parishioner of some experience to serve as chair, assisted by a membership of relative newcomers to the parish. If you like getting in on the ground floor, if you want to get acquainted with parishioners, if you get a kick out of planning good times while having one yourself, do call Jeff (344-3749). He'd really like to hear from you!

Night for Committee Members got such rave reviews, the Council plans to do it again. Sometime in November; committee members take note!

Goal-setting this year will be done by individual committees at their monthly meeting, led through the process by members of the Development Committee.

In acknowledging his appreciation of her assistance in this role, Fr. Remm said,"Cecelia has been an excellent trustee and a trusted friend. She has given unselfishly of her time and energy to the parish, doing physical work, such as painting cabinets in the priests' residence, as well as giving wise and prudent advice. She is a very special lady."

St. Patrick's is served by two trustees, one male and the other female, parishioners chosen and appointed by the pastor. Last summer Tom Kacich was appointed to this position, succeeding Bill Subick.

The tenure of trustees has been changed from "life or exhaustion, whichever comes first," to staggered terms of about three years. Fr. George Remm says, "At St. Patrick's the trustees have more to do than sign an occasional resolution. They actively advise me. They meet with me every month, in addition to the times we are together at the executive committee meetings of the Parish Council. They truly provide a sounding board for me."

The appointment of Shirley Splittstoesser to this post continues a tradition of women's service as parish trustee that began with Edith Jendrasiak in 1978. She was followed, in turn, by Mary Claire Uselding, Cathy Rutledge, and Cecelia Weir. They have combined their parish service with motherhood, careers, and community service.

Of our newest parish trustee Fr. Remm says, "I worked with Shirley [on the ad hoc Development Committee] and came to respect her knowledge, insight, and good common sense. She dealt with parish financial matters for many years. She went with me and others to a diocesan workshop on parish finances. So I feel that her acquaintance with those aspects of parish life will give me good guidance."

In carrying out her new responsibilities Shirley is not without excellent role models. In addition to the example given by her predecessors, we commend to her the faithfulness of Ruth, the courage of Judith and Esther, the loving care of Mary, the perseverance of Joan of Arc, the diplomacy of Teresa of Avila, the forthrightness of Catherine of Siena. To these we add Mother Cabrini's shrewd business sense, the undemanding generosity of Dorothy Day, and, in our own time, the challenging charity of Mother Teresa.

With gratitude and appreciation for her gracious and generous gift of time and talent, we salute Cecelia Weir. And we welcome Shirley Splittstoesser as she takes up this new ministry in our community.
