#### Parish offers classes for adults

In a twofold approach this fall, Fr. Tim Nolan and Carolyn McElrath will collaborate in presentations on the documents of Vatican II and an introduction to the Bible.

On Sunday evenings, from 6:45 p.m. to 7:45 p.m., beginning Oct. 3, Fr. Tim and Carolyn will alternate as facilitators in exploring the documents that grew out of the Second Vatican Council, opening the Church to dialogue with the modern world. The first document to be explored is "The Dogmatic Constitution on the Church" (Lumen Gentium, 21 Nov. 1964), to be followed by "The Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World" (Gaudium et Spes, 7 Dec. 1965).

On Saturday mornings, from 10 to 11 a.m., beginning Oct. 9, Carolyn

and Fr. Tim will present an overview and introduction to the Bible: the Torah, the historical books, the wisdom books, the prophets, the Gospels, the Letters, and Revelation. They plan to focus on how study and meditation on the Bible can help us live out our faith in today's world.


The Parish Council will provide and serve fried chicken. The Knights of Columbus will serve iced tea and lemonade.

#### Redemptive Intimacy

A New Perspective for the Journey to Adult Faith

#### by Dick Westley

Redemptive Intimacy came out of small group experiences and is designed to facilitate and be a resource for them. It is at one and the same time the story of Dick Westley's own journey and an invitation to others to explore their own story.

It is a strong statement about the relationship between faith and life. The central theme of this book is that for Christians redemption and intimacy are really one and the same.

"If you are somewhat embarrassed by the rather simplistic and childish way you continue in adult life to speak of faith to your children," Westley writes, "who find what you say about God and Church totally unbelievable, then you have had some of the same experiences I have had and will find this book helpful."

His work is founded on two basic assumptions: that God is revealing himself to us in our experience, and that dialogue, faith sharing, and experience sharing in the name of the Lord are an essential work of the People of God. He says, "We are called not only to do something, but also to be something—or better, to be the Lord together. Our doing

Ideally this book should not be read alone; it has been written with deep conviction about the importance of experience and the absolute necessity of all of us sharing our faith and experiences with one another. "If you are alone," Westley says, "this book

might be a good way for you to take the initiative of starting such a group. Usually, in every parish or neighborhood there are those who are starving for dialogue and faith sharing, and they will eagerly respond if you but put out the call."

#### Dick Westley to speak at Roncalli Society meeting



The fifth annual fall conference of the Roncalli Society will be held on Tuesday, Oct. 12. The featured speaker, Dick Westley, will address members, guests, and friends on "Small Faith Communities: Facing the Future."

Dick Westley is no stranger to St. Patrick's parishioners. He has spoken here twice, each time sharing his experiences with small "base communities."

His most recent project is an ongoing newsletter published by the Thomas More Association titled In the Meantime: Articulating the Vision of the Church. The name developed out of his belief that "the Church that was has not yet fully passed from the scene, and the Church that is aborning has not yet fully made its appearance. What we have is Church 'in the meantime.'"

Well-known for his experience with parish base communities, he will speak of the impact and role of these groups on the future of the

At their September meeting Parish Council members noted that volunteers are still needed to help make a new parish pictorial directory a reality. Miriam Nirider is spearheading the activity but needs help of various kinds.

Parishioners who are able to schedule their photograph sessions in October are likely to have prints available for Christmas gift giving. By special arrangement, photo sessions can be scheduled over the Thanksgiving weekend for families that may be joined by out-of-town students for the holiday.

An update of the diocesan Annual Stewardship Appeal: \$67,209 has been pledged; of this amount, \$44,400 has already been paid.

And for the St. Patrick's Catholic Education Foundation: \$88,209 has been pledged, of which \$28,450 has been paid. Fr. Remm plans a presentation to the parish on the Foundation on the last Sunday of September at all Masses, with an open parish meeting on Sept. 30, 7:30 p.m. in the multipurpose room, to answer questions parishioners may have.

The Sacrificial Giving renewal has been planned for Nov. 13-14. Cards for pledging the gift of "treasure" as well as "time" and "talent" will be handed out at all Masses on that weekend, with parishioners asked to return them that day if possible or to bring the cards back the following weekend, with all cards brought to the altar with our more traditional gifts of bread and wine on Nov. 20-21.

The Council's workshop on objectives is planned for Oct. 23, 9 a.m. to

noon, with all committee members and staff participating. Joe Pavia will facilitate the workshop.

Appreciation Night for members of all standing committees of the Council and for staff is planned for Nov. 11. Fran Cousin and Miriam Nirider are heading up the planning team.

The revision of the timetable for the budget process means that committees need not present information supporting new and continuing programs until Jan. 11, after the holidays.

The Council heard plans for the second annual "You can Make a Difference" day. Parishioners are asked to bring non-perishable food items to Mass on Oct. 16-17 (or to the parish center until Oct. 20). Volunteers are needed to pack the food items for delivery to the Eastern Illinois Food Bank on Oct. 23. Drivers with vans are needed to help with delivery.

The Social Action Committee has been working on developing a relationship with a "sister church" in Bethlehem, Council members agreed to the committee's proposal to donate \$500 from the budgeted Refugee Fund to Habitat for Humanity to be used in finishing the house being built ? for a parish family whose home was destroyed by fire several months ago.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held Oct. 21. All parishioners are welcome to attend these open parish meetings. Church. His topic will be developed through several presentations, each followed by dialogue, reflection, and/or questions.

## "I promise you ..."

Although you may not recognize the name of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, the devotion that she helped popularize in the 1600s is familiar to Catholics to this day.

Margaret Mary, while a Sister of the Visitation, experienced visions of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. To her, and through her to the world, were given promises that have exerted a strong influence on popular Catholic piety and devotion to the Sacred Heart.

She is perhaps best remembered for promoting this great promise of Jesus: "I promise you in the immense mercy of my Heart that to all those who will receive Holy Communion on the first Friday of nine consecutive months, my almighty love will give the grace of contrition at the end of their lives. They will not die in my disgrace nor without receiving the sacraments. My Sacred Heart will be their safe refuge at that last moment."

Margaret Mary was born in the Burgundy region of France in 1647. As a young girl she suffered from a crippling rheumatic condition. At 24 she entered a convent of the Sisters of the Visitation, founded by St. Francis de Sales, at Paray-le-Monial.

There, between 1673 and 1675, she received four visions of Jesus concerning devotion toward his heart, a symbol of his love for humankind. At a time when this congregation of religious placed emphasis on the ordinary and the simple, Margaret Mary's visions were mistrusted by her religious superiors and the other sisters, yet she persevered in communicating the messages of love Jesus gave to the world through her.

Her considerable patience and trust in the Lord during all her trials contributed greatly to her eventual canonization. By the time of her death in 1690 the opposition from her community was at an end and the devotion to Jesus' Sacred Heart had

spread beyond the confines of her convent.

Through the efforts of Margaret Mary, the feast of the Sacred Heart, the Friday following the octave day of the Feast of Corpus Christi, was established in 1856. In 1899 Pope Leo XIII consecrated the whole world to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. (It is interesting to note that the devotion to the Sacred Heart is not exclusively Catholic; many English Puritan theologians are known to have promoted it as well.)

The devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus consists primarily in attention to the inexhaustible source of mercy and love poured out for us by God through the pierced heart of Christ. His heart symbolizes God's love for us in a very human way.

We remember St. Margaret Mary on Oct. 17.

# Local Pax Christi group studies "just war" criteria

Given the persistence of war in today's world, the Church's criteria for determining when resorting to open warfare is justified merit close examination.

The general framework of the socalled just war theory was developed by St. Augustine (354-430) not long after the conversion of Roman emperor Constantine. Within this framework, however, the Church's teaching has evolved to reflect changing times and continuing revelation.

For a war to be considered "just," each of the following criteria must be met:

- 1) Just cause. The purpose of the war must be to resist impending danger against innocent life or basic rights.
- 2) Competent authority. The decision to go to war must be made by a competent authority, responsible for the common good.
- 3) Comparative justice. The issues involved in the conflict must be sufficiently compelling to warrant risking the destruction caused by war.
- 4) Right intention. The objective of the war must be to resolve the conflict and pursue peace (not, for instance, to retaliate for an offense).
- 5) Last resort. All alternative means of resolving the conflict must first be exhausted.

- 6) Probability of success. There must be a reasonable probability that resort to war will resolve the conflict.
- 7) Proportionality. The cost and damage associated with the war must not exceed the good pursued.
- 8) Discrimination. Innocent civilians must never be the target of an attack.

Application of these criteria to specific situations requires subjective judgment and interpretation. Political leaders may proclaim that a war is just without making a sincere effort to verify that the criteria for a just war have been met—or can be met

Others argue that in the heat of conflict, leaders are unable to examine the criteria in a dispassionate and unbiased manner, bringing into question the practical usefulness of the just war theory as a guide for setting policy on war and peace.

Given the nature of modern warfare, moreover, the likelihood that such criteria as proportionality and discrimination can be met is extremely slim. Statements by recent popes indicate a narrowing of their interpretation of just cause and of comparative justice, undoubtedly reflecting the growing and indiscriminate devastation inflicted during modern warfare.

Father's Day Hashbrown Casserole

32 oz frozen hashbrown potatoes 1 t salt

1/4 t pepper
1/2 c chopped onion
1 can cream of chicken soup
16 oz sour cream
2 c grated cheddar cheese
1 c crushed corn flakes
1/2 c melted margarine



Thaw hashbrowns. In a large bowl mix all but the corn flakes and margarine. Place in greased 9 x 13 inch pan or dish. Sprinkle corn flakes on top and drizzle with margarine. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.
