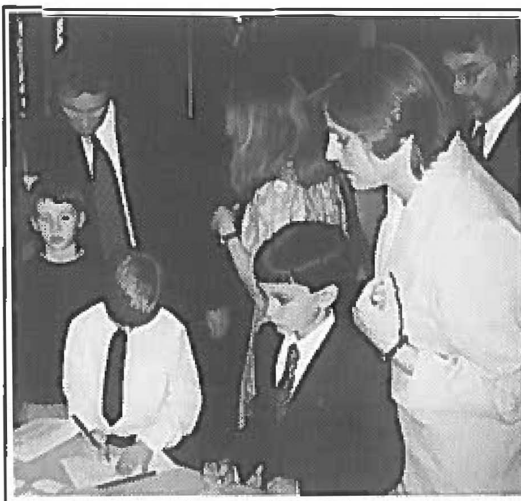

Moving through grief to healing

Grief is a natural response to the loss of a loved one. Grief is also a response to circumstances beyond our control, such as the loss of irreplaceable items due to tornado or flood, the loss of intimacy when a close friend moves to take a job or go to school elsewhere, or a change in lifestyle due to the loss of a job (whether voluntary or involuntary).

For those who grieve, the following "Mourning Rights" (reprinted from Catholic Cemeteries of Phoenix newsletter):

These twelve freedoms are guidelines to help you in your grief. Use the ideas that make sense to you. Post them on your refrigerator, and read them often as you move toward your healing.

1. You have the freedom to realize your grief is unique.
2. You have the freedom to talk about your grief.
3. You have the freedom to expect to feel a multitude of emotions.
4. You have the freedom to allow for numbness.
5. You have the freedom to be tolerant of your physical and emotional limits.
6. You have the freedom to experience grief attacks or memory embraces.
7. You have the freedom to develop a support system.
8. You have the freedom to make use of ritual.
9. You have the freedom to embrace your spirituality.
10. You have the freedom to allow a search for meaning.
11. You have the freedom to treasure your memories.
12. You have the freedom to move toward your grief and heal.

This marks the beginning of a series of articles directed to those who have suffered personal loss.

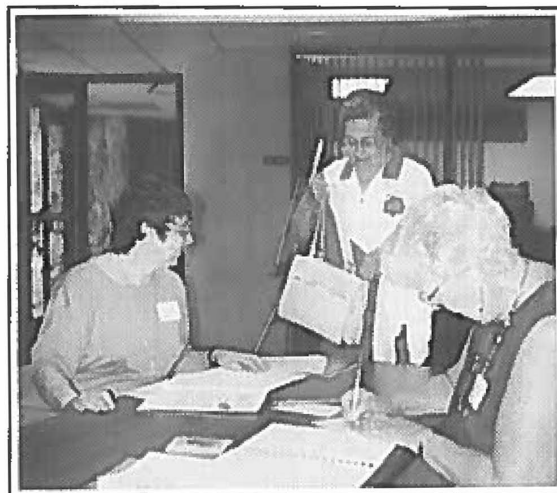
Blessed are those who mourn . . .

In his sermon on the mount Jesus acknowledged the suffering of those who grieve and mourn: "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted." His words hold out hope even today to all who have suffered the loss of loved ones.

On a Saturday in May, 17 widows and widowers came to St. Patrick's to participate in a retreat designed exclusively for them: Life After Loss. From LaSalle, Champaign, Danville, and Urbana they came; from St. Matthew's, Holy Cross, and St. Patrick's, and more. Men and women with one thing in common, the loss of a spouse.

Guided by Sr. Charlene Cesario, assisted by Mary Maglione and Jean Daly, they prayed together and in quiet, alone; they reflected on the video "Invincible Summer: Returning to Life after Someone You Love Has Died"; they journaled and sang; they spoke with full hearts and shared something of their memories, their pain, their joy. They listened with open hearts to the thoughts and feelings and experiences shared by others. They prayed for discernment, to know God's call, God's touch, God's will. They prayed for one another.

And through it all, the process of healing, comfort, and hope.





Parish Council News

At their May meeting, Council members reviewed the process initiated with this year's ASA drive and pronounced it quite successful. A total of \$75,412 was pledged, with \$32,763 of this amount paid; 412 pledge cards were received.

Allocation of end-of-year funds was suggested by the Development Committee: for Susan Nagele, \$6000 (a tithe of year-end funds); for our sister church in the Holy Land, \$1000; for ministry to Hispanics, \$1000; for new software for Business Operations and Education, \$3000; for a new stage for the main hall, \$6000; for remodeling of the kitchen (to a designated fund), \$40,000.

The Hispanic ministry will get underway promptly with Mass celebrated in Spanish one Sunday afternoon monthly, with the possibility of moving to a weekly schedule with Mass celebrated by one of four priests who will be learning phonetic Spanish for this purpose.

Work on the parking lot has been delayed. The City of Urbana is willing to let us pave the alley but wants to suggest how it should be done. Research is underway to determine how to make a request to the City for financial assistance. The work is already out on bid.

A new Financial Administration Manual developed by the Diocese of Peoria for reference and use by parishes includes many practices and procedures already implemented by St. Patrick's.

Bids for the new stage for the main hall are starting to come in; all should be in hand for the next Council meeting.

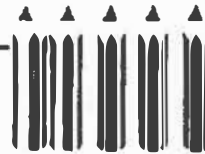
At this point in the meeting outgoing members Mary Long, Richard Keane, and John Mudrick commented on their service to the parish through membership on the Parish Council.

Mary Long invited the newly elected parishioners (Peter Bloome, Pat Holden, and Frank Modica) to be seated on the Council. All then adjourned to a prayer service in the church, followed by a social in the parish center.

When the new Council convened, a slate of nominees for Council office was presented; with no other nominations from the floor, the candidates for office were unanimously elected: Dick Justice, president; Jean Daly, vice-president; Peter Bloome, secretary. Judy Conover agreed once again to continue her service to the Council as recording secretary. New members and officers will be commissioned at the 10:30 Mass on June 2.

Council members approved reallocating \$1400 from Steve Peet's music budget, at his request, for purchase of a new synthesizer, with the remaining \$1000 needed for it to come from a donation pledged by a parishioner for this purpose.

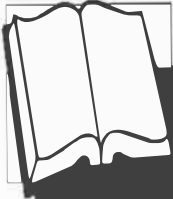
Faculty and staff, who have worked hard to make this a wonderful year, deserve special thanks.

Proclaim Praise: Daily Prayer for Parish and Home

People of the church have, from the beginning, marked the morning and the evening with prayer. Song and psalms and scripture have been part of this time. *Proclaim Praise* is designed to help those who would continue this tradition. It offers a way to pray with and as the Church. It is a simple way to let the psalms become ours again, and so let them teach us to pray.

The book presents a short form of the Church's Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer, and Night Prayer. It also includes psalms for Midday Prayer and blessings at table for those who find mealtime the best time to gather for prayer.

Although it is intended especially for use by the various groups that meet in parishes, individuals or members of a household praying together, or other small groups, will also find it an agreeable and simple vehicle for prayer.

If you have found *Liturgy of the Hours* confusing, this book is for you! It may also serve as an easy introduction to *Liturgy of the Hours* by acquainting you with the form of this prayer: an introductory verse, a hymn appropriate to morning or evening, a psalm, silence and a prayer that concludes the psalm, a reading from scripture, the canticle from the gospels, prayers of intercession, the Lord's Prayer, and a concluding verse.

Information in the introduction and discreet notes throughout guide without distracting. Suggestions for using *Proclaim Peace* in a small group are marked by simplicity. Beautifully designed, easy to ready and to hold, this small book delights as it helps to raise the mind and heart to God. The psalms appear here in the recent new translation by ICEL, which seeks to be faithful to the original text by speaking in direct and strong language.

Quick fixin's from the kitchen of . . . Rose Brown

Wafer Cookie Dessert

- 1 pkg Lorna Doone cookies, crushed
- 1 stick butter or margarine
- 2 3-3/4 oz pkgs instant vanilla pudding
- 2 c milk
- 1 qt butter pecan ice cream, softened
- 1 medium container Cool Whip
- 2 or more Heath Bars, crushed



Mix crushed cookies with melted butter or margarine. Line a 9 x 13 inch pan with the mixture. Place the pan in the freezer while making the pudding.

Combine pudding and milk; mix well. Add ice cream; pour over cookie mixture lining the pan. Spread Cool Whip over all and sprinkle with crushed Heath Bars. Refrigerate.

Great food, lousy weather, at Confirmation retreat

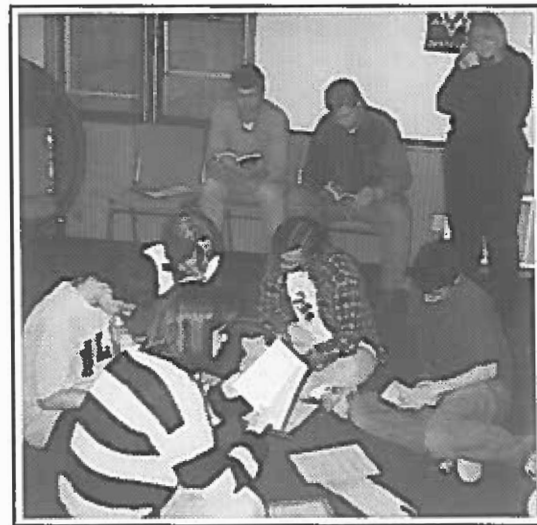
"The food was great, the retreat was really good, but the weather was terrible," summed up one Confirmation candidate's response to the Confirmation retreat held at Camp Greisham on the weekend of April 27-28.

The Confirmation candidates spent their first session reflecting on family members and friends who had been important to them in their journeys of faith and closed with a prayer service thanking God for the gift of those people in their lives. The second session invited the candidates to reflect on their relationship with Jesus and on the qualities of Jesus that they most admired.

Early Sunday morning, having been awakened by clanging silverware on pots and pans, the candidates spent time reflecting on and choosing a Confirmation name, followed by a session on the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

The retreat concluded with a Mass celebrated by Fr. Remm at which the candidates were called forward by their Confirmation names and presented with the Cross of Christ.

Confirmation will take place at 7 p.m. on Saturday, June 8. Congratulations to all our candidates!

Parish Wish List

The basic concept of the parish wish list is to present to parishioners a list of items that, although not included in the parish budget, might be acquired through earmarked donations. Such items in the past have included the patio and benches at the east side of the church, the mobile coat racks used for large gatherings in the multipurpose room (e.g., Children's Liturgy), the new piano for the choir loft, a large video projector, organ renovation, and microfilming of historical records.

These were considered not absolutely necessary but beneficial, nice to have, even advantageous to the operation of the parish, enriching the spiritual or enhancing the communal aspect of parish life, or just bringing a higher level of efficiency to regular parish operations.

The following items were proposed for the wish list by the parish music director, Steve Peet, to enrich and enhance our liturgical services:

- * handbells varying in cost from \$178 to \$229;
- * a storage case for the handbells costing \$120;
- * cleaning and polishing for the handbells costing \$750;
- * various musical instruments ranging in cost from \$70 to \$500.

It is not necessary to contribute the total amount for any given instrument; all donations of any amount are gratefully accepted.

Fr. Remm will be happy to discuss the purpose of the wish list with interested parishioners or to answer questions about individual items on it. However, you may also contact Steve directly for more specific information about any of them.

Pro-Life Committee announces the phone tree

St. Patrick's Pro-Life Committee has organized a phone tree to establish more effective communication with our federal legislators when life issues are the subject of proposed legislation under discussion.

The idea of the phone tree comes from the National Council of Catholic Bishops and works as follows:

- * The diocese is notified of a life-issue piece of legislation coming up for a vote and contacts the individual parish representative. The parish representative contacts our federal representatives to inform them of his or her position.

- * The parish representative calls each team captain, who then calls each of five team members. The team captain also contacts our federal representatives to inform them of his or her position.

- * Each team member contacts our federal representatives to inform them of his or her position.

- * At each level of the phone tree individuals are also asked to call at least one or two additional people, requesting that they contact our federal representatives to inform them of their position.

The process is very simple; it can really make an impact on our federal representatives in House and Senate. It is an easy way to have your voice heard. Just three phone calls for each piece of legislation. If you are interested in participating in the phone tree, call Lu Pillar (344-4909). She will be happy to sign you up!



ASA 1996 Give yourself a gold star!

In his April letter regarding the 1996 Annual Stewardship Appeal, Bishop John J. Myers said, "God is gracious and generous, offering abundant life through the resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. As people of God, we are called by him to reflect his graciousness and goodness."

During the Annual Stewardship Appeal weekend in May, the praiseworthy generosity of the people of St. Patrick's Parish reflected God's graciousness and goodness. Congratulations to all who contributed to that generosity! As of May 21, 491 pledges were made, totaling \$84,101. Of that amount, \$35,847 has already been paid.

Fr. Remm commends the people of St. Patrick's for their gracious generosity! All donations surpassing the diocesan goal for our parish, \$69,767, will be returned as a rebate to the parish and credited as extraordinary income. (Extraordinary income is not used in computing the diocesan goal for the parish, so it will have no influence on the goal set for St. Patrick's next year.) Any rebated funds will be used to augment the parish's important Centennial Fund.

The people of St. Patrick's are to be congratulated also for assisting the parish in moving the ASA from a two-weekend process to a one-weekend process. The "new way of doing ASA business" was deemed a success and will be used again in coming years. A very special thanks to all ASA volunteers for assisting in this success!

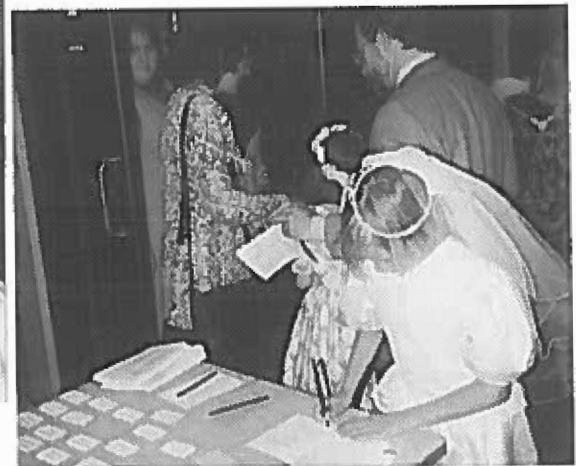

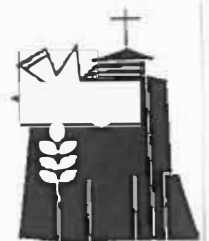
