Sharing Enthusiasm for the Faith

"St. Patrick's Church appealed to me for several reasons," shares **Brock Peoples**, one of our new Catholics (a.k.a. neophytes). "There is a vibrant faith community at St. Patrick's that welcomes newcomers in a way that other

churches often do not. Also, Father Joe's enthusiasm quickly became contagious; at the time we started to come to St. Pat-



rick's, neither my wife nor I were strong in our faith. His inspiring example kept us coming back and that led to a rediscovery of our faith life.

"My wife, Michelle, introduced me to the Catholic faith, which became the next step in my religious exploration. After being raised Methodist, it was not a large doctrinal jump to the Catholic Church." Brock was impressed by the definitive answers given to many issues and by the two thousand years of Church tradition and history.

Married in August 2004, Michelle and Brock live in Savoy with their son, Patrick, born last August. Brock works as a production editor for AOCS Press in Urbana, as a freelance page designer, and manages a small online poetry press.

Our parishioners will find a similar vein of inquiry, discovery, and shared enthusiasm in each of the stories of the men and women who joined the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil. During the process known as the Rite of Christian

Initiation of Adults, or RCIA, they were guided by Father Joe and supported in their journey by the RCIA team, by their sponsors, and by our prayers.

"My wife and I kept hearing good things about this parish," relates Gale Stafford. "She was raised in

the Catholic faith in her home country of Venezuela. It was mainly my wife's influence as a Catholic that drew me to inquire



into this faith more seriously.

"I love to learn and explore new ideas about things. My wife and I have two wonderful daughters, ages 4 and 10." Gale works in Information Technology at the UI.



Help is urgently needed

"My employer is sending me out of town next week and I've called everyone on the list [parishioners who take Communion to our parish shut-ins], but I can't find anyone who can take Communion to the homebound in my place. I don't know what to do! Can you help?"

This recent cry for help underlines the great need St. Patrick's pastoral care ministry is experiencing. The number of ministers has declined to the point that it's often very difficult to find someone who can step in when needed.

If you've ever been separated from your faith community for any length of time because of illness, convalescence after surgery, or frailty, you know just how much these visits mean to our shut-ins. If you can help for a couple of hours once a month, or even once every other month, please call Donna Thompson (688-2701). She will be delighted to hear from you and will see to it that you receive "on the job" training with an experienced pastoral care minister.

The need is great, and urgent.

Personnel Committee benefits St. Patrick's

Who do you call if you need a copy of your baptismal record?
Who do you call if you have a question about a particular hymn at Mass? Who do you call to have a meeting room reserved or furniture placed for a meeting or event? What about your record of giving to St. Patrick's for tax purposes? Yes, you call a member of the parish staff.

St. Patrick's is extremely fortunate to have an excellent team serving the parish family. And who assists the pastor in recruiting and retaining our staff, in making sure that appropriate screening procedures are followed for the volunteers who work with our children, etc.? That would be the Personnel Committee.

When a vacancy occurs, the Personnel Committee assists the pastor in identifying the specific duties and responsibilities required for the position. The committee places advertisements in the bulletin, the local newspaper, the diocesan newspaper, and professional journals when appropriate. The committee then assists the pastor through the interviewing process.

To ensure that staff members are paid equitably, the Personnel Committee performs salary surveys every other year. This survey is sent to other parishes of similar size in the diocese and to some other dioceses in Illinois, Wisconsin, and Indiana. In addition, the committee looks at what is paid in the general area for similar positions. Recom-



mendations for adjustments to the salary ranges for staff positions at St. Patrick's are then made to the pastor and the Parish Council. For the years when such a survey is not conducted, the committee looks at the cost of living figures to determine whether a salary adjustment

should be recommended.

The Personnel Committee keeps informed concerning new laws and regulations pertaining to employees that have been recently enacted by state and federal governments as well as by the Diocese of Peoria. This information, as well as any recommendations, is discussed with the pastor before implementation of any staff policy changes.

This committee usually meets only on a quarterly basis, or when various issues arise—such as the currently pending staff vacancies. Thus the committee is not always busy and may not be as noticeable as, say, the Financial Affairs or Building and Grounds committees. The work of the Personnel Committee, however, is important, and the benefits are important to our parish staff as well as to our parish community as a whole.

Q: Why do we bring people into the Church during the Easter Vigil?

A: The ancient

custom in the Church

is to give the sacraments of initiation—Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Communion—on this night.

It makes sense to celebrate these sacraments at Easter because, as stated in the Rite of Initiation of Adults, "the initiation of Christians is the first sacramental sharing in Christ's dying and rising." This timing also brings the new Christians into the rhythm of the Church

year. The season of Lent, when the whole parish is trying to grow deeper in faith, is the time of final spiritual preparation for the new Christians. During the Easter season, we join together in celebrating the joy of faith.

Adults who wish to join the Church and who have never been baptized are called "catechumens." Those who have already been baptized are called "candidates." The Catholic Church recognizes the validity of baptisms done in any Christian church; consequently, only catechumens are baptized during the Easter

Vigil.

This year St. Patrick's was blessed with adults who wanted to join the Church, all of whom were candidates (that is, already baptized), so they were not baptized during the Easter Vigil. In addition, four members of one family took the first step toward full membership in the Church by being baptized.

"What attracted me to St. Patrick's was Father Joe," says Jonathan Arambula, a native of San Juan, Puerto Rico, who also lived in Cancun and Acapulco, Mexico, as a child. "I have always been attracted



to the tradition and the underlying meaning of every single event in the Mass and have been to several Masses from all

regions. I have not found a priest as charismatic and passionate about Christianity as Fr. Joe is. His weekly homily is filled with spiritual and philosophical enlightenment and a sense of humility that I did not see in my Baptist background. From Dr. Susan Nagele

Susan sent the following brief updates on the events in Kenya.

Feb. 10:

It's been a busy week at the hospital, and it's clear that people are not being honest about who is displaced and who is trying to get something for free. These situations always cause a lot of jealousy and mistrust. The poor local people are in need as well. Chris has been faced with the problems of trying to get relief to the people who really need it. I'm just busy with a lot of sick people. We got a new registrar (Family Medicine Resident) this week; his name is Jeremiah Lactabai, and he's a very fine young man. We really have been blessed with the reg-



istrars that have come to us so far. We also got three new nurses, helping to replace the two who haven't come back from Christmas break and the one who left to work with the government. The clinical officer who was away for Christmas came back, replacing the one who left. All in all, we are ahead one doctor to deal with all the sick people, but that's better than most places, I think.

The negotiations going on in Nairobi seem to be making some progress. People seem hopeful that something will be worked out politically so that more violence doesn't occur. At least here we haven't been seeing more trouble, and we are grateful for that. Let's hope that this week everything will settle down and people can start to repair their lives. It rained twice this past week, and people should be in their fields preparing to plant their maize and beans. Thanks for all your prayers and support.

Feb. 16:

I am happy to say that there has been no new violence in our area this past week. We've had loads of people coming to the hospital. Everyone is psychologically traumatized. That brings a lot of physical complaints that won't be well treated with pills. There are three people with tumors that weren't worked up before because they were poor. One woman has severe hyperthyroidism. Lots of pregnant women have come, too. One woman on her ninth pregnancy got to our clinic the week before she delivered. We were able to confirm that she had twins, and we found out that she is HIV+. She had no problems with delivering in our hospital. She now has ten children, no home, no husband present (he ran in a different direction), and a life-threatening chronic illness. In my book, she's one of the strongest people in this country.

Meanwhile, the politicians continue to negotiate at an exclusive hotel somewhere safe. To their credit, they have stopped the violence and have made some progress. They will start again next week. People remain hopeful that a political solution will be found so that the government will begin functioning again. The alternative, more violence or even civil war, is just too awful to contemplate.

We are now well into Lent and I admit to being tired. But all I have to do is remember that pregnant woman and take a nap.

Parish Council News

St. Patrick's Parish will soon have some improved meeting spaces, thanks to planned renovation of the five classrooms and library, members of the St. Patrick's Parish Council heard at their meeting February 21.

The Building and Grounds Committee has scheduled remodeling which will include new lighting and carpeting—to start in May after Confirmation and conclude before Vacation Bible School the last week of June. Fr. Joe Hogan noted that groups usually want to meet in the lounge or the multipurpose room because these are nicer rooms: remodeling the classrooms will make them more usable for meetings.

In other business:

· Fr. Hogan said that Stauder Architecture met with the Second Century Advisory Committee in mid-February, with eight or nine potential schemes for expanding the capacity of the church and parish hall. "The designs were very interesting, with different concepts of what could happen here," he said. The committee asked for a few changes, and Stauder will come back with three proposals.

While there is no time frame for those proposals, Fr. Hogan said the committee would like to get the concepts to the Parish Council, staff, and parishioners as soon as possible.

· June 7 has been set aside for a good-bye event in honor of Father Hoa, who is going back to Vietnam after three years in the U.S.; parish secretary Leslie Risatti, who is

retiring after approximately 22 years; and music director Chris Angel, who is leaving after seven years on the parish staff. The Personnel Committee is advertising for a new music director and

secretary, and it is hoped that the new hires will be in place before Leslie and Chris leave.

- The Parish Council approved the updated Parish Council's Bylaws, which have been undergoing revision for the past few months.
- The Parish Council Election Committee—Kathy Sarnecki, Ellen Noonan, Linda Weber, and Pat Mayer—has been compiling a list of potential candidates. Biographies of the candidates are sched-

uled to be included in the bulletin April 5-6, with the election taking place April 12-13.

During ministry reports, Mary Karten announced that schedules for liturgical ministers are now being e-mailed when possible. This is expected to save the parish several reams of paper a year and associated copying costs.

Fr. Hogan said he would like

to see the parish have two main social events each vear: a St. Patrick's Day celebration and a summer event. He noted that he could envision the St. Patrick's celebration becoming a

weeklong event, with St. Patrick's taking up the challenge to combat the campus bars' "Unofficial" St. Patrick's. "We need to teach the community how to celebrate St. Patrick's Day," he said.

The next Parish Council meeting will begin at 7 p.m. on Thursday, April 17, in the parish center following at 6:30 p.m. gathering in the church for prayer. All parishioners are welcome to attend these open meetings.

... to serve on the Parish Council? You don't have to know a lot of people in the parish but, by the end of your term, you'll surely have made some wonderful new acquaintances. You don't have to have a close personal relationship with Fr. Joe and the parish staff, but you'll have many opportunities to get to know them as you serve. You don't have to know everything that's going on in the parish—no one else does either. But during your service, you'll come to appreciate the variety of activities in the parish and meet some of the dedicated people who help make them happen.

News from the Ministry of Consolation

The Spring Evening of Remembrance will be held on Wednesday, April 16, at 7:00 p.m. in the multipurpose room. We

gather on this evening to remember our friends and loved ones who have died in the last several months. There is time for sharing memories and stories of their lives, and the evening ends with a prayer service for those

who have gone before and those of us who remain to cherish their memory. It is an evening for reflecting on the people and the love that have touched us and made us who we are and on the mystery of the Communion of Saints. Anyone in the parish who has lost a friend or family member is welcome to participate in the Evening of Remembrance.

The Prayer Shawl Ministry has a new schedule. There will be two times each month when those who wish to work in a group may do so. One group will meet on the second Saturday of each month from 9:00 to 10:30 a.m., the other on the fourth Friday of each month from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. Both groups will meet in the parish center. The session includes a prayer of blessing for those present, the work of their hands, and the person who will receive the shawl. All participants pray silently as they work, making their prayer a part of the shawl. People help one another when they are stuck on a stitch or something doesn't look just right, but for the most part it is a quiet activity. Patterns and yarn are available; please bring your own needles or hooks. Donations to help offset the cost of yarn are appreciated. Mark your donation "Prayer Shawl" and drop it in the collection basket on Sunday or

leave it at the parish center.

Cancer Companions will meet on Tuesday, April 8, at 7:00 p.m. to share a time of prayer, quiet, and

companionship. This group of women who are facing or who have faced cancer continue to inspire one another with their spirit of hope and courage. The 20-year survivors have much to share with those who have just

passed a one-year anniversary or are still undergoing treatment. The April meeting will begin a bimonthly schedule of gathering on the second Tuesday of the month. Future Companions evenings will be in June, August, October, and December. If you know a woman who has faced or is facing cancer, please invite her to come to a Companions evening.

The Ministry of Consolation is cosponsoring an Expressive Writing Workshop on Friday, April 11, from 8:00 a.m. until noon at the parish center. The presenter will be Sharon Bray, who is nationally known for her work facilitating writing groups.

This experiential workshop is designed for individuals who wish to understand or incorporate writing as a way to heal from loss, serious illness, or other life difficulties. Participants will learn about kiey research on writing and healing, have the opportunity to write in response to exercises and prompts, and explore and discuss the transformative power of words to heal the wounded spirit. Sharon Bray has led writing workshops for women with breast cancer for over ten years and is an exciting and enthusiastic presenter.

Co-sponsors of the workshop include the Self Help Center at Family Service, the Mills Breast Cancer Institute, and others. There is a \$25 fee for the workshop and 4 CEUs (Continuing Education Units) are available. There will be a 20-hour intensive writing workshop the same weekend at a cost of \$200 for those who wish to become writing group facilitators. Keep Easter going in your life

We have just celebrated Easter, representing the high point of hope in our faith journey. We now have an opportunity to continue to move forward on our spiritual journey by participating in a once weekly program sponsored by St. Patrick's over the coming five weeks, beginning April 6.

The components of this readingbased adult education program are: (1) a film about Henri Nouwen, the author of several books on the spiritual journey; (2) reading group participation on his book Life of the Beloved: Spiritual Living in a Secular World; and (3) a public lecture at St. Patrick's by Ed Wojcicki, a member of the Board of Directors of the Henri Nouwen Society.

The program starts at 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, April 6, with the movie Journey of the Heart. This one-hour film presents Nouwen's life and faith journey. After viewing the film, those who wish can purchase the book and sign up to participate with others in a reading group.

You may have already read some of Henri Nouwen's books, including this one. Now you have the opportunity to join with others for community, hospitality, reflection, and spiritual nourishment.

The book Life of the Beloved affirms us as children of God. Nouwen uses the analogy of the Eucharist to describe the movement of the Holy Spirit in our lives: taken, blessed, broken, and given. The book is written as a letter to a young reporter from The New York Times who did not yet share Nouwen's spiritual vision. Its 119 pages pack a lot to reflect upon.

Copies of the paperback book (for purchase) and the reflection guide (free) will be available at the first meeting on Sunday, April 6, at 1:30 p.m. in the multipurpose room of the parish center. Child care will be provided for this meeting and for the public lecture on May 4 at 1:30 p.m.

They will visit a Winnebago Indian Reservation just north of Omaha, and go to Adventure Land near Des Moines, Iowa, on their way home. Their choice for the theme of this year's trip is "I AM."

The teens are also scheduled to help build two garden sheds for Habitat for Humanity on April 19 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. This activity not only provides "service work" but also a chance to get hands-on experience with tools.

- 1 c sugar
- 1 c Crisco
- 3 c white flour
- 1 t lemon zest

Mix Crisco and sugar well. Add flour and lemon zest slowly, and mix well. Roll dough with a rolling pin and cut into circles. Place on a cookie sheet lines with waxed paper or parchment, and bake at 350° for 20-25 minutes. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.
